



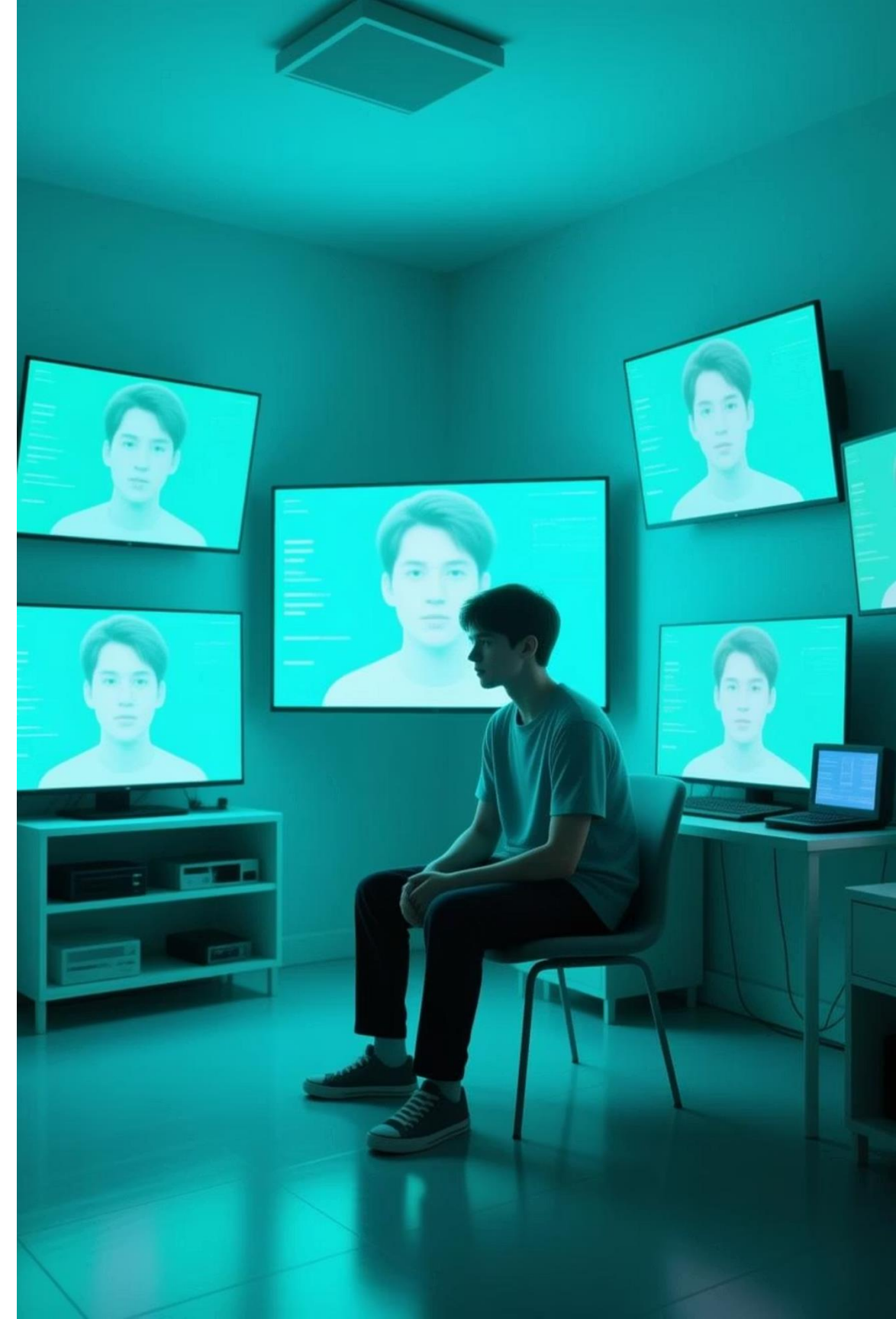

Core idea: Understanding the inherent human need for **authentic connection**



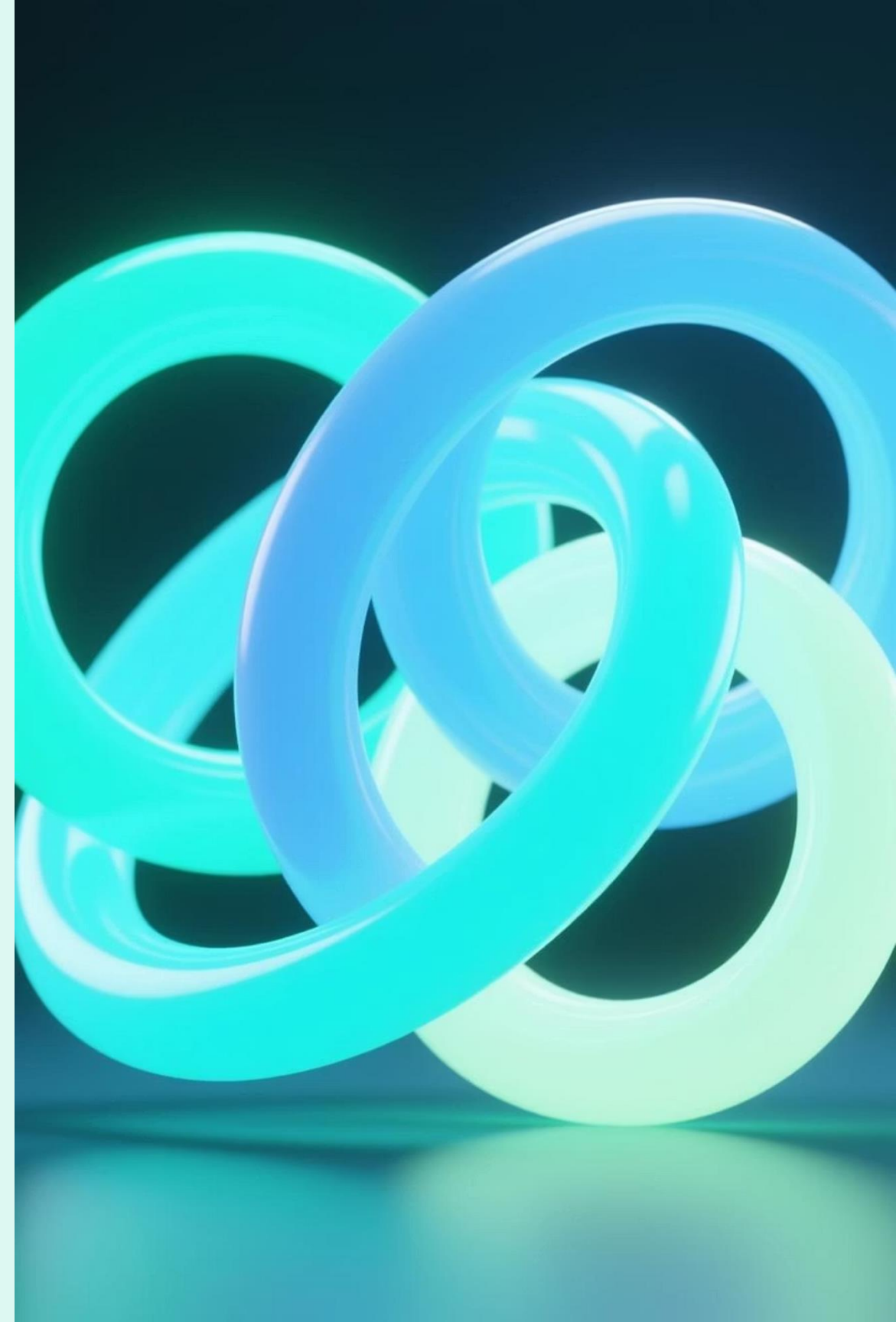
# Communication as Communio

- Lived reality of ecclesial life

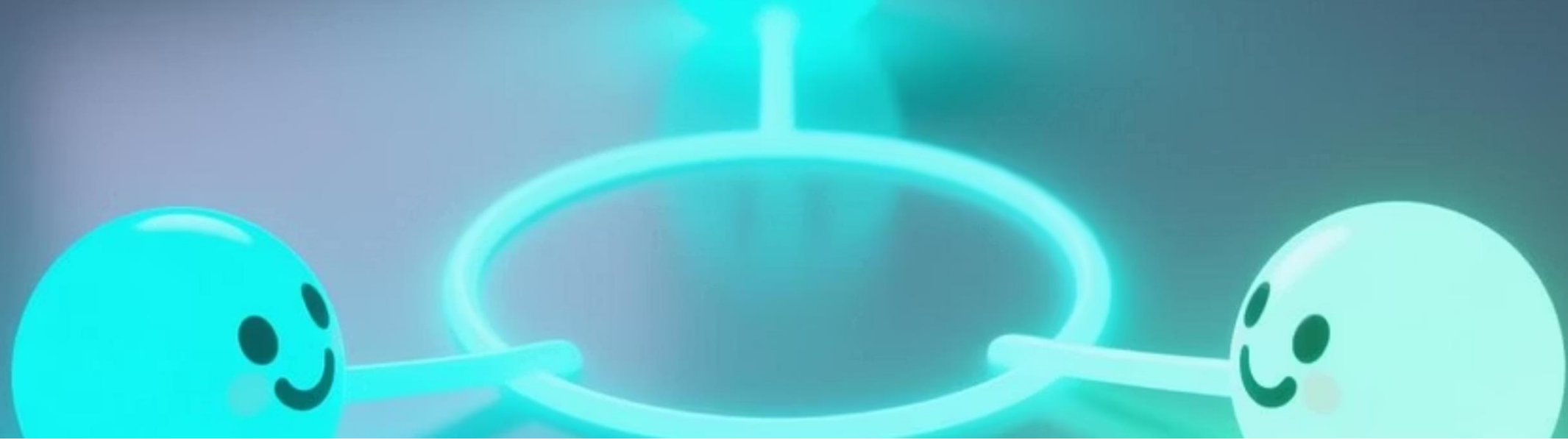

## Communication **Begins in God**

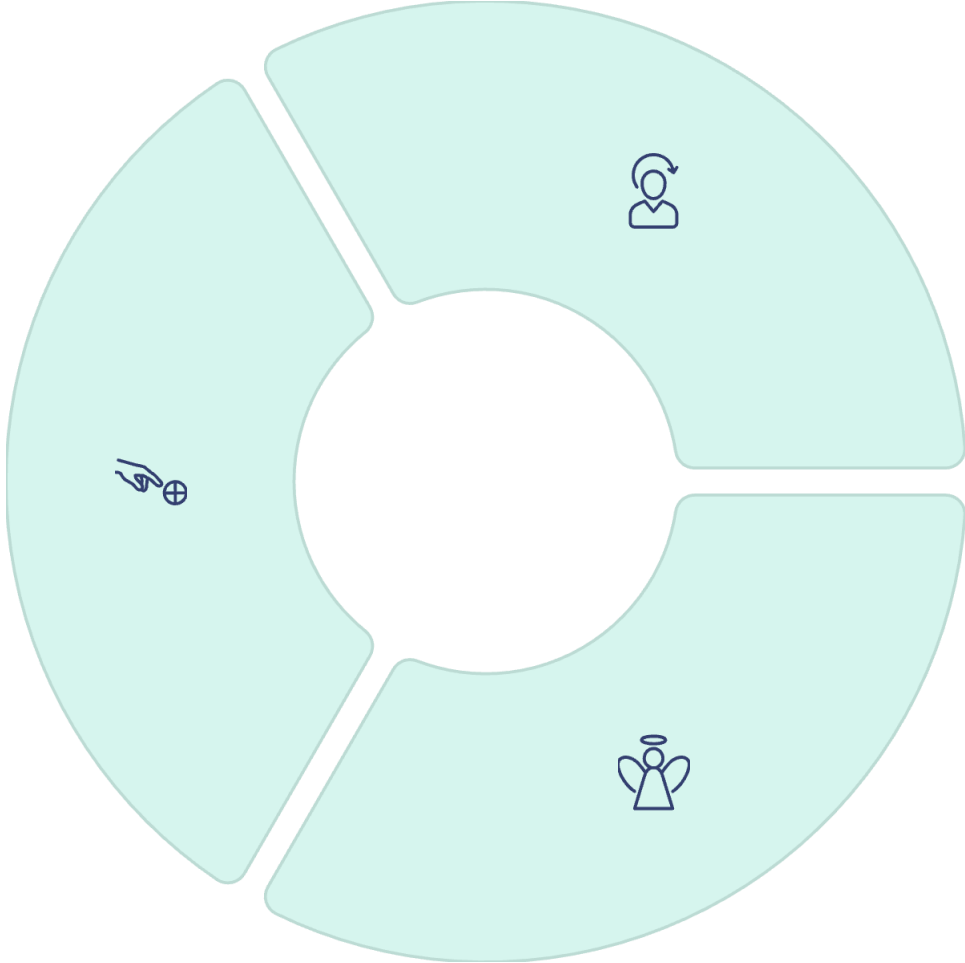
"God is an eternal exchange of love, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and He has destined us to share in that exchange"

The Word made flesh—ultimate divine communication

## Holy Spirit

Ongoing presence guiding us into truth

Communication: participation in Trinitarian life

# The Church as Sign and Instrument

"The Church, in Christ, is in the nature of sacrament—a sign and instrument of communion with God and of unity among all people"

— Lumen Gentium, para. 1

- ① Communication: not merely functional but **constitutive** of the Church's being



## Eucharistic Communication

"Communication achieves its highest fulfilment in the Eucharist, the supreme act of communion"

— *Communio et Progressio*, para. 11



# Communication as **Mission**

"The Church would feel guilty before the Lord if she did not utilize these powerful means [of communication]... to proclaim the Gospel"

— Redemptoris Missio, para. 37

Apostles as communicators of the Word made flesh

Communication is not an add-on to mission. It *is* mission

— Benedict XVI, 2009

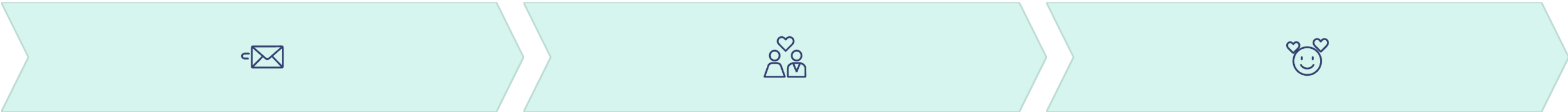
## The Person Behind the Screen

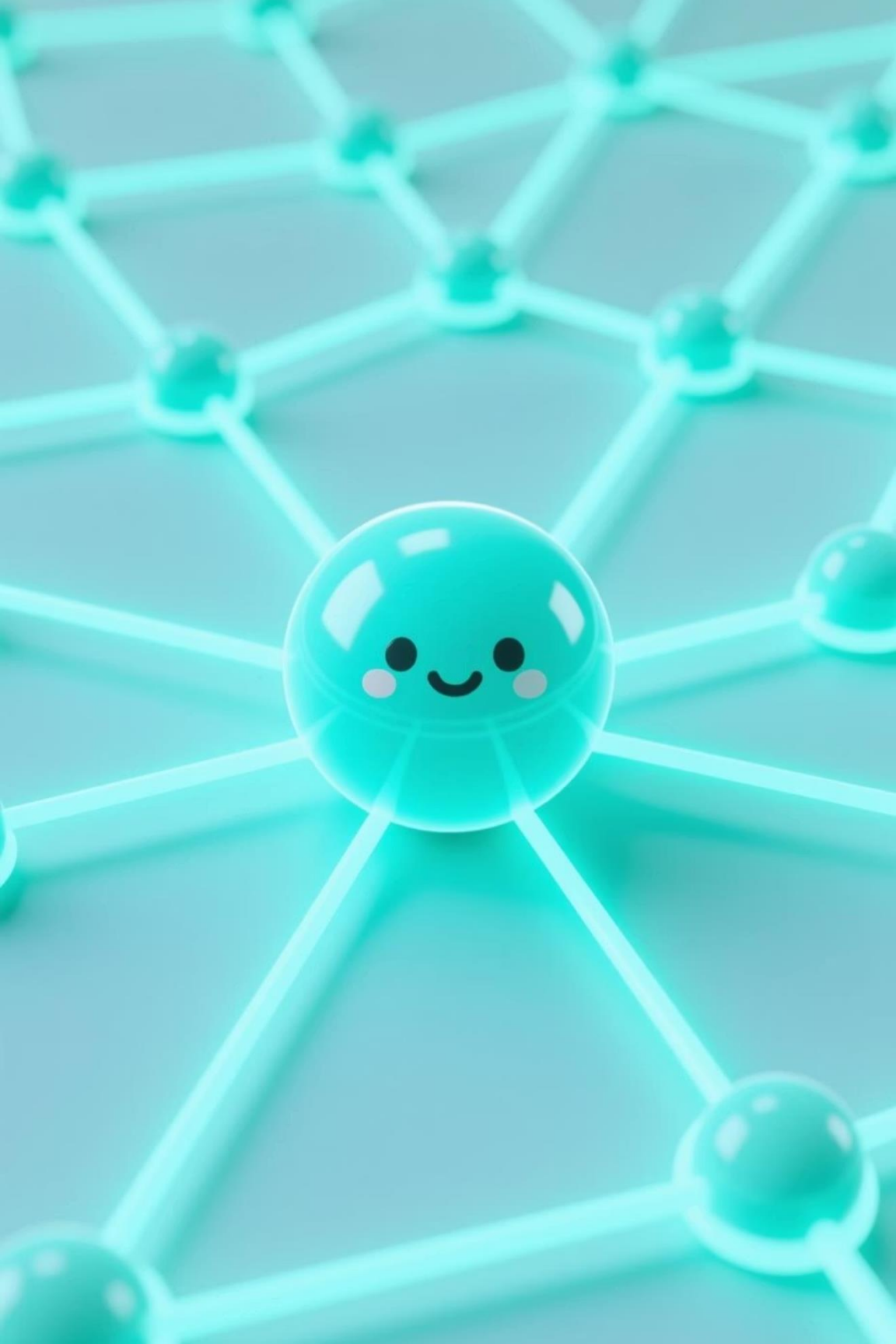
Not just better content creation but formation in:

□ The foundation of Catholic communication is not strategy, but sanctity



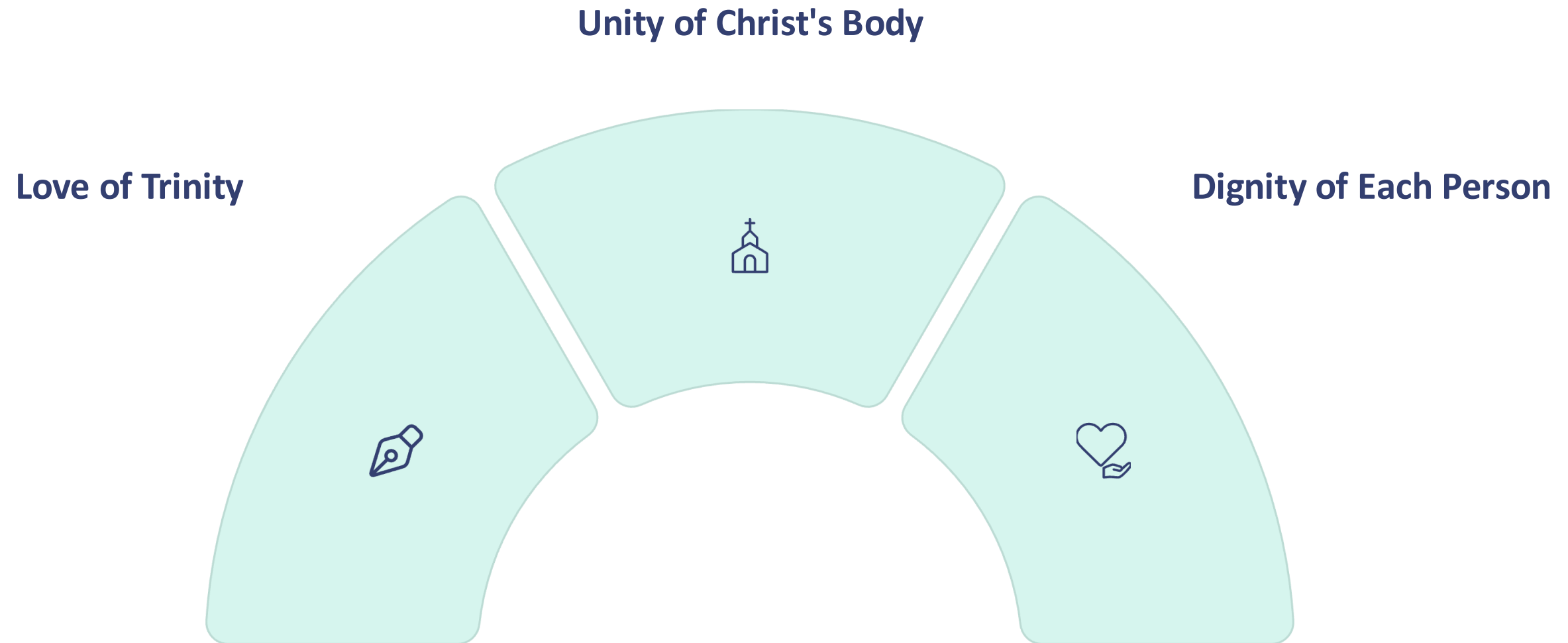
## Models of Communion
