Formation of priests and religious is intimately related to their identity, that is their core, and mission, which stems from that identity.

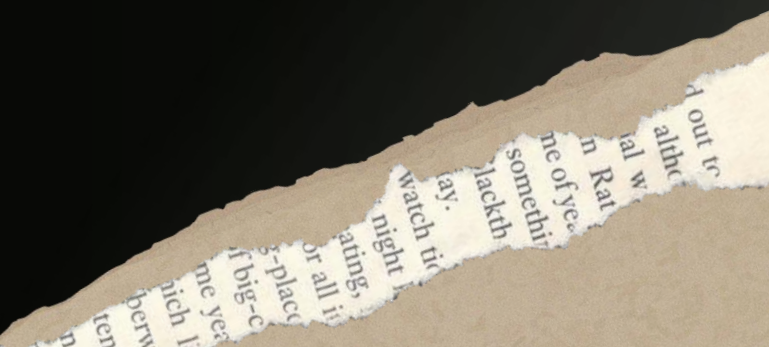




II VATICAN COUNCIL

“The priest is not his own,” but acts in the person of Christ for the people of God.

In today’s digital world, this identity is even more critical.





PRE-VATICAN

Priesthood as Sacramental Authority

- standing apart from the laity as leaders of worship and administrators of grace through the sacraments.

Religious Life as a Separate Vocation

- superior form of Christian living, marked by vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience, and distinct from the common life of laypeople.

Clerical Elevation

- set apart from the laity in a way that created a sharp distinction between the ordained/religious and the faithful.

LUMEN GENTIUM

- Transformed the Church's understanding of priesthood and religious life by rooting their identity in baptism, a sacrament that all Christians share.
- This shift marked a radical change, as it emphasized the common priesthood of all believers
- Maintaining the distinct, yet complementary, nature of the ordained priesthood and religious life.

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BAPTISM AS FOUNDATION

- A share in Christ's priestly, prophetic, and kingly offices.
- The foundation for all vocations within the Church

“The holy people of God shares also in Christ's prophetic office; it spreads abroad a living witness to Him, especially by means of a life of faith and charity and by offering to God a sacrifice of praise” (LG, 12).

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COMMON VS MINISTERIAL

- Distinctiveness of the ordained priesthood but
- Framed it in relation to the common priesthood of all the baptized.

“The ministerial priesthood... and the common priesthood of all the faithful participate, each in its own proper way, in the one priesthood of Christ” (LG, 10).

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PROPHETIC WITNESS

- The vocation of religious men and women as a prophetic witness within the broader community of the baptized.
- Identity is not a superior state of Christian living but a unique expression of the common call to holiness.

“The evangelical counsels... appear as a sign which can and ought to attract all the members of the Church to an effective and prompt fulfilment of the duties of their Christian vocation” (LG, 44).

IDENTITY IN THE DIGITAL WORLD

Authentic Presence in the Digital World

- engage with digital media not as mere users but as ministers of the Gospel.

Technology as a Tool for Ministry

- helping to build authentic relationships, foster evangelization, and deepen prayer.

Maintaining Relational Ministry

- maintain genuine human connections, ensuring that their ministry reflects Christ's love, compassion, and personal encounter.

CHALLENGES & DISRUPTIONS

1. Fragmented Sense of Self

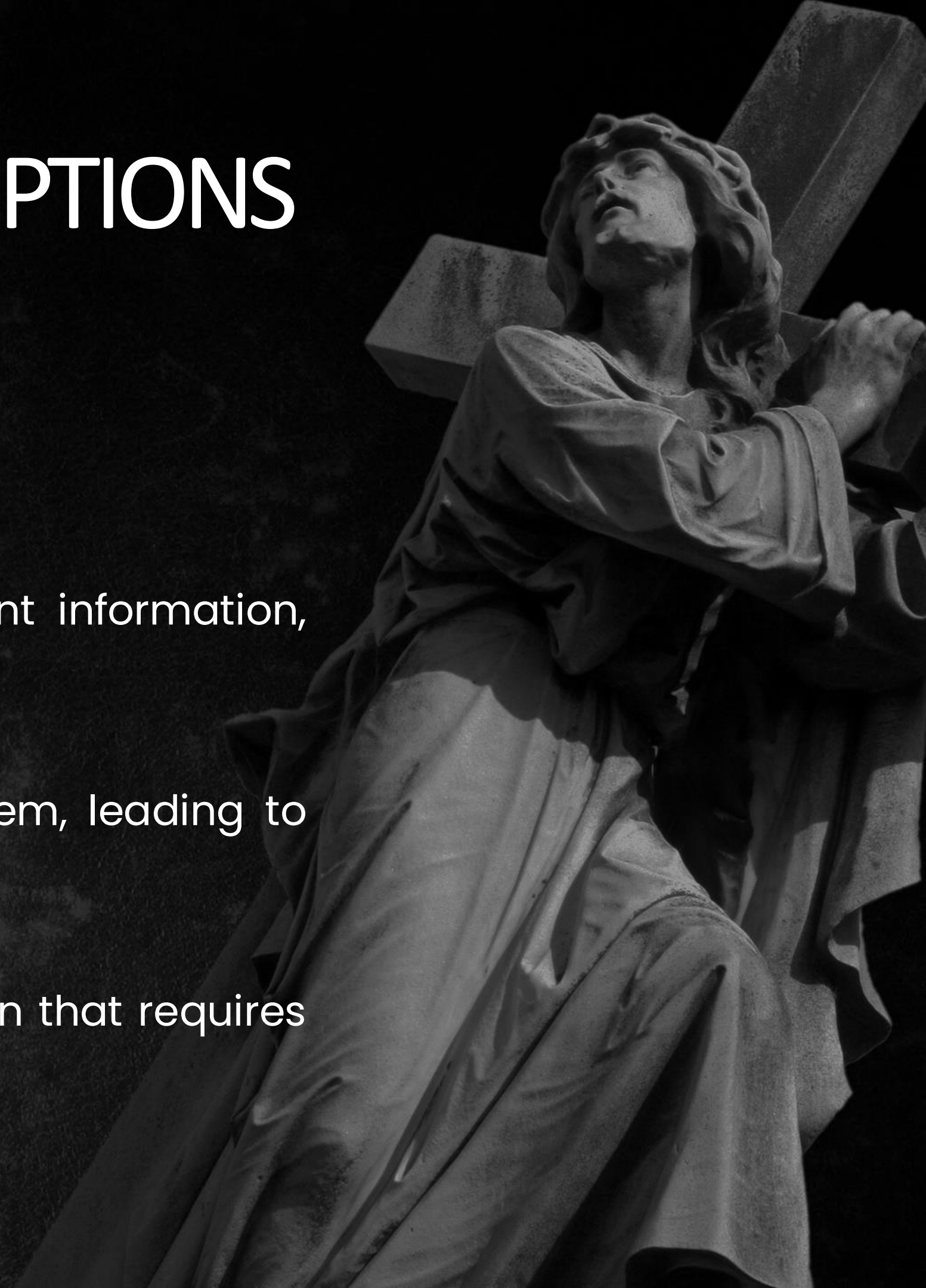
- individuals can curate and present themselves in ways that may not align with their true self... for validation through likes, shares, and followers.
- conflict with the deeper call to authenticity in Christ, focusing on the interior life and personal holiness
- absorbed in the pursuit of approval, popularity, or personal branding, weakening their true vocation.



CHALLENGES & DISRUPTIONS

2. Addiction to Instant Gratification

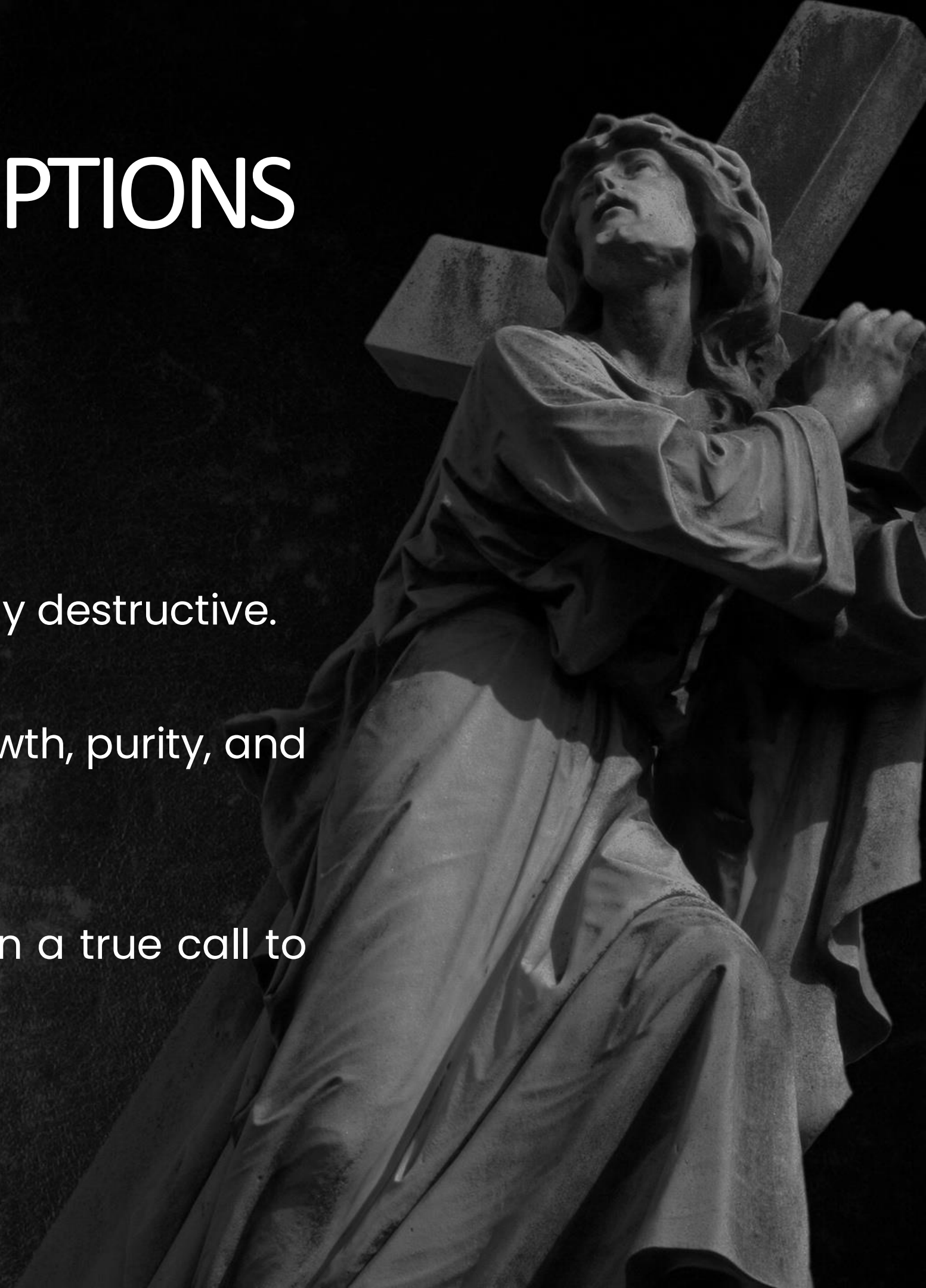
- platforms designed to provide quick responses, instant information, and rapid satisfaction.
- instant rewards stimulates the brain's dopamine system, leading to dopamine addiction.
- eroding of patience, discipline, and delayed gratification that requires embracing silence, contemplation and prayer.



CHALLENGES & DISRUPTIONS

3. Exposure to Harmful Content

- access to content that is harmful, immoral, and spiritually destructive.
- can lead to temptations that damage their spiritual growth, purity, and commitment to the evangelical counsels.
- can cloud judgment and weaken one's ability to discern a true call to priesthood or religious life.



CHALLENGES & DISRUPTIONS

4. Superficial Relationships

- relationships are fleeting, shallow, and based on appearances or mutual interests rather than genuine love and communion.
- call is for authentic relationships rooted in Christ, accompanying others in a spirit of true pastoral care.
- can create a false sense of community and belonging, distracting from the real, incarnational relationships that are essential in ministry.



CHALLENGES & DISRUPTIONS

5. Information Overload

- can lead to confusion and an overload of conflicting opinions making it difficult to hear the voice of God amid the noise.
- discernment is clouded with too much external input, especially from sources that do not align with Church teaching or spiritual wisdom..
- elevation of celebrities and influencers as role models, offering a different vision of success and fulfilment.



THE WAY FORWARD



WAY FORWARD

1. Digital Discipline and Healthy Boundaries

- need to teach digital discipline, helping students set healthy boundaries with technology.
- limiting time on social media, prioritizing face-to-face interactions.
- ensuring periods of digital detox for prayer, reflection, and retreat.

WAY FORWARD

2. Deepening the Spiritual Life

- through the sacraments, personal prayer, and community life.
- cultivate the virtues of patience, humility, and self-discipline.
- these are critical in resisting the temptations of the digital world.



WAY FORWARD

3. Guided Use of Technology for Evangelization

- digital Technology offers opportunities for evangelization.
- guide students on how to use digital platforms responsibly, ensuring reflection of their priestly or religious identity.
- technology should serve their mission, not detract from it.

WAY FORWARD

4. Formation of Authentic Relationships

- importance of real, incarnational relationships can help counter the superficial connections fostered online.
- encourage them to develop deep, meaningful friendships and pastoral relationships
- both within the seminary and with the communities they will serve.

WAY FORWARD

5. Discerning with Clarity

- include training in discernment in the digital age to develop a clear sense of their calling amid the noise of the online world.
- includes fostering a reflective attitude, rooted in prayer and guided by spiritual directors.
- discern what truly leads to a deeper relationship with Christ.
